The Enduring Legacy of Freemasonry in Modern Society

Greeting Brothers of San Francisco Lodge,

This article provides comprehensive historic information regarding the first established lodge in California. The questions regarding its status as Lodge number No.2 are given some explanation but it also causes me to wonder where California Lodge No.1, (13) received its Charter. More to come in future articles.

California Rich Masonic History

First Masons in California

The first Masons of California were part of a fraternity that played a significant role in shaping the state's history. They were involved in building civic infrastructure, facing challenges during the Civil War, and contributing to the state's development. The Grand Lodge of California was officially opened in Sacramento in 1850, and it has since become a central institution in the state's Masonic tradition.

Western Star Lodge No. 2 is the oldest chartered Masonic lodge in California, dating back to 1848. It was established by Peter Lassen and Saschel Woods, who brought the charter from the Missouri Grand Lodge. Initially located in Benton City, it relocated to Shasta in 1851 and has a rich history intertwined with the development of California and the town of Shasta.

Key historical details

- Early Origins: The Lodge's formation was largely driven by the efforts of Peter Lassen and Saschel Woods, according to Masons of California. Peter Lassen, a Danish-born frontiersman and charter member, arrived in California from Missouri in 1840.
- Saschel Woods' role in bringing the Western Star Lodge #2 charter to California was pivotal. Saschel Woods' commitment to Freemasonry and his willingness to transport the charter across the country were crucial in establishing the first Masonic Lodge in California. This act laid the foundation for the spread of Freemasonry within the territory, even before it achieved statehood.
- Custody of the Charter: Woods took possession of the charter, granted by the Grand Lodge of Missouri in 1848, which formally authorized the establishment of Western Star Lodge #98 in California.
- Journey West: Woods brought the charter with him on Peter Lassen's wagon train, traveling west to California. Lassen was eager to establish a Masonic lodge on his land grant near present-day Vina.
- Forming the Lodge: Upon arriving in California, Woods, designated as Master on the charter, formally established Western Star Lodge #98 and conducted its first meeting on October 30, 1849, in Benton City, according to Masons of California. This meeting occurred before the formation of any other lodge in California, establishing Western Star's pioneering status.
- Influence in Naming: The name "Benton City" itself was chosen through Woods' influence, as he admired Senator Thomas Hart Benton of Missouri.
- Meeting Places: Initially chartered to open a lodge at Benton City, Upper California, its early history saw the Lodge meeting on the upper floor of Dr. Benjamin Shurtleff's home following the Great Fire of 1853, which destroyed much of the city of Shasta and the Lodge's possessions, except for its Missouri charter.
- Current Building: The Lodge trustees purchased the upper floor of the current building (originally a mercantile business built in 1854 by Norton and Tucker) on December 4, 1854. In 1857, the Lodge acquired ownership of the entire building, which was dedicated on December 27, 1854, and has been in continuous use by the Lodge ever since.
- Significant Dates:
- O 1848: Chartered by the Grand Lodge of Missouri.
- O 1853: Lost its possessions in the Great Fire of Shasta.
- O 1854: Purchased the upper floor of its current building and dedicated it.
- 1857: Acquired full ownership of the building.
- o 2023: Celebrated its 175th anniversary.

There's a no.2 in its title, but the Western Star Lodge in Shasta is No. 1, as in the first, among Masonic lodges in the Golden State.

The original charter for Western Star Lodge No. 98, Free and Accepted Masons, was granted on May 10, 1848, two years before California became the 31st state in the union, and its first meeting was held Oct. 30, 1848. Those dates are significant for a couple of reasons: First, the state's second lodge, San Francisco's California Lodge No. 13, held its first meeting two weeks later, on Nov. 15, 1848; more importantly, this summer, the Western Star Lodge will celebrate its 175th anniversary.
